134K **133,500 non citizens** residing in **Baltimore** are potentially at risk of deportation.

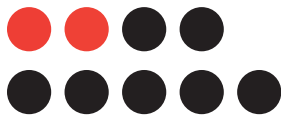
443K **443,500 non citizens** residing in **Maryland** are potentially at risk of deportation.

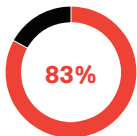

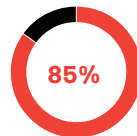

49,900 immigrants in Baltimore are **students** enrolled in pre-K through college or graduate school.

Economic and labor force contributions

Immigrants in Baltimore and Maryland contribute critical tax dollars to the local economy and are indispensable members of the workforce.

Baltimore Metro Area

\$12.1B Immigrant-led households **earned \$12.1 billion.**

\$1.1B Immigrants contributed **\$1.1 billion** in combined **state and local taxes.**

\$2.4B Immigrants contributed **\$2.4 billion** in **federal taxes.**

\$8.7B This means immigrant-led households have an estimated **\$8.7 billion** in **spending power.**

Maryland

\$39.7B Immigrant-led households **earned \$39.7 billion.**

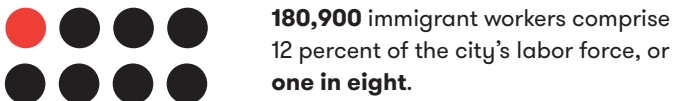
\$4.1B Immigrants contributed **\$4.1 billion** in combined **state and local taxes.**

\$8B Immigrants contributed **\$8 billion** in **federal taxes.**

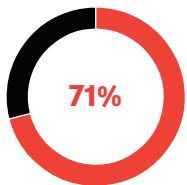
\$27.6B This means immigrant-led households have an estimated **\$27.6 billion** in **spending power.**

Baltimore Metro Area

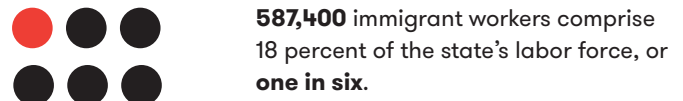

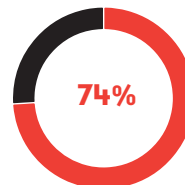


71 percent of the city's immigrants **participate in the labor force**, greater than the share among the city's native-born population (67 percent).
