

Immigrant population

The foreign-born population in Dallas and Texas represent an important and diverse share of their local communities, many of whom live in mixed-status families.

Dallas Metro Area



1.4 million immigrants reside in **Dallas**, or **19 percent** of the total population.

Texas



4.9 million immigrants reside in **Texas**, or **17 percent** of the total population.

Population at risk of deportation

864K **863,900 non-citizens** residing in **Dallas** are potentially at risk of deportation.


3M **3 million non-citizens** residing in **Texas** are potentially at risk of deportation.

Dallas Metro Area



There are **718,300** children in Dallas with at least one **immigrant parent**.



Local community ties



1,009,600 immigrants have lived in the Dallas metro area **since 2009 or earlier**.



At least **331,000** homes in the Dallas metro area are **owned by immigrants**.



111,100 immigrants in the Dallas metro area are **entrepreneurs**.



177,800 immigrants in the Dallas metro area are **students** enrolled in pre-K through college or graduate school.

Economic and labor force contributions

Immigrants in Dallas and Texas contribute critical tax dollars to the local economy and are indispensable members of the workforce.

Dallas Metro Area

\$50.3B Immigrant-led households **earned \$50.3 billion.**

\$4.1B Immigrants contributed **\$4.1 billion** in combined **state and local taxes.**

\$8.8B Immigrants contributed **\$8.8 billion** in **federal taxes.**

\$37.5B This means immigrant-led households have an estimated **\$37.5 billion** in **spending power.**

Texas

\$161B Immigrant-led households **earned \$161 billion.**


\$13.1B Immigrants contributed **\$13.1 billion** in combined **state and local taxes.**

\$25.3B Immigrants contributed **\$25.3 billion** in **federal taxes.**

\$122.6B This means immigrant-led households have an estimated **\$122.6 billion** in **spending power.**


Labor force participation

Dallas Metro Area




947,300 immigrant workers comprise **24 percent** of the labor force.


Texas



3.1 million immigrant workers comprise **22 percent** of the state's labor force.



71 percent of immigrants **participate in the labor force**, comparable to the share among the native-born population (69 percent).



67 percent of the state's immigrants **participate in the labor force**, comparable to the share among the state's native-born population (65 percent).
