Immigrant population

The foreign-born population in the United States represents an important and diverse share of the country, many of whom live in mixed-status families.



323 million people reside in the **United States**.



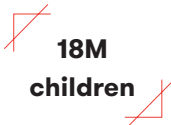
44 million immigrants reside in the **United States**, making up **13 percent** of the total U.S. population.

Population at risk of deportation

22M **22 million** of the **immigrants in the United States** are **non citizens** who are potentially at risk of deportation.

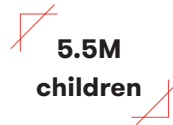
21M **21 million** of the **immigrants in the United States** are **naturalized citizens** who are not at risk of deportation.

Children and families



18M children

There are **18 million children** in the United States with at least one **immigrant parent**.



5.5M children

There are **5.5 million U.S. citizen children** with **non citizen immigrant parents**.



1 in 4

One in four children in the United States has at least one **immigrant parent**.



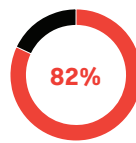
2 in 7

Two in seven children of immigrants are **U.S. citizens** with **non citizen immigrant parents**.



88%

The **vast majority of children** in the United States with at least one immigrant parent are **U.S. citizens**. 88 percent were born in the United States.



82%

82 percent of U.S.-born children of immigrants have at least one **immigrant parent** who has lived in the United States for **10 years or more**.

Local community ties



35.6 million immigrants have lived in the United States for **more than 10 years**.



5.6 million immigrants in the United States are **students** enrolled in pre-K through college or graduate school.



9.8 million immigrants in the United States are **homeowners**.



72 percent of immigrants aged 25 years or older living in the United States are **high school graduates**.

Economic and labor force contributions

Immigrants in the United States contribute critical tax dollars to the local economy and are indispensable members of the workforce.

\$1.6T Immigrant-led households **earned \$1.6 trillion**.

3.2M **3.2 million** immigrants in the United States are **entrepreneurs**.

\$150B Immigrants contributed **\$150 billion** in combined **state and local taxes**.

8M **8 million** people in the United States are **employed by immigrant-owned firms**.

\$308.6B Immigrants contributed **\$308.6 billion** in **federal taxes**.

45% **45 percent** of U.S. Fortune 500 companies were **founded by immigrants or their children**.

\$1.2T This means immigrant-led households have an estimated **\$1.2 trillion** in **spending power**.

\$65.5B Immigrant-owned firms earned **\$65.5 billion** in **business income**.

Labor force participation

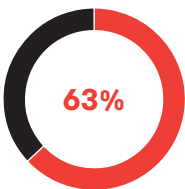
163M
people

163 million people comprise the United States's labor force.

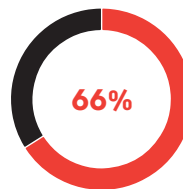


1 in 6

26 million immigrant workers comprise 16 percent of the country's labor force, or **one in six**.



63 percent of the country's residents **participate in the labor force**.



66 percent of the country's immigrants **participate in the labor force**, higher than the share among the country's native-born population (63 percent).
