

# Minneapolis, Minnesota

## Immigrant population

The foreign-born population in Minneapolis<sup>1</sup> and Minnesota represent an important and diverse share of their local communities, many of whom live in mixed-status families.

### Minneapolis Metro Area



**366,300 immigrants** reside in **Minneapolis**, or **10 percent** of the total population.

### Minnesota



**448,400 immigrants** reside in **Minnesota**, or **8 percent** of the total population.


**173,700 non-citizens** residing in **Minneapolis** are potentially at risk of deportation.


**222,900 non-citizens** residing in **Minnesota** are potentially at risk of deportation.

## Children and families

### Minneapolis Metro Area



There are **205,200 children** in Minneapolis with at least one **immigrant parent**.



**One in four children** in Minneapolis has at least one **immigrant parent**.




The **vast majority of children** with at least one immigrant parent in Minneapolis are **U.S. citizens**. 85 percent were born in the United States.

### Minnesota



There are **248,200 children** in Minnesota with at least one **immigrant parent**.



**One in five children** in Minnesota has at least one **immigrant parent**.



The **vast majority of children** with at least one immigrant parent in Minnesota are **U.S. citizens**. 86 percent were born in the United States.

## Local community ties



**292,800** immigrants in Minneapolis have lived in the United States for **10 or more years**.



**79,400** immigrants in Minneapolis are **homeowners**.



**20,400** immigrants in Minneapolis are **entrepreneurs**.



**76,800** immigrants in Minneapolis are **students** enrolled in pre-K through college or graduate school.

<sup>1</sup> "Minneapolis" and "Minneapolis Metro Area" refer to the MN-WI metropolitan statistical area, which includes not only Minneapolis, but St. Paul, Bloomington, and parts of Wisconsin.

# Economic and labor force contributions

Immigrants in Minneapolis and Minnesota contribute critical tax dollars to the local economy and are indispensable members of the workforce.

## Minneapolis Metro Area

**\$14B** immigrant-led households **earned \$14 billion.**

**\$1.2B** immigrants contributed **\$1.2 billion** in combined **state and local taxes.**

**\$2.5B** immigrants contributed **\$2.5 billion** in **federal taxes.**

**\$10.2B** This means immigrant-led households have an estimated **\$10.2 billion** in **spending power.**

## Minnesota

**\$15.8B** immigrant-led households **earned \$15.8 billion.**


**\$1.4B** immigrants contributed **\$1.4 billion** in combined **state and local taxes.**

**\$2.9B** immigrants contributed **\$2.9 billion** in **federal taxes.**


**\$11.5B** This means immigrant-led households have an estimated **\$11.5 billion** in **spending power.**

## Labor force participation

### Minneapolis Metro Area


 **245,400** immigrant workers comprise 12 percent of the city's labor force, or **one in eight.**




**73 percent** of the city's immigrants **participate in the labor force**, greater than the share among the city's native-born population (72 percent).

### Minnesota

 **296,000** immigrant workers comprise 10 percent of the state's labor force, or **one in 10.**

1 in 10



**72 percent** of the state's immigrants **participate in the labor force**, greater than the share among the state's native-born population (70 percent).
